Spring Clean!

It is that time of the year again – Spring Cleaning! Whether you are moving or staying, I thought it would be nice to share some key points for cleaning your apartments so that you or the next person can have a clean and fresh environment!

Kitchen

- Pull the stove unit out to clean the corners behind. It is not as heavy as you thought and it is easy to pull it out. Please make sure it is not hot before you touch anything!
- Check the fan hood above the stove unit. The oil would build up and collect dust, and I am pretty sure no one would want some extra dust flavour in the food.
- Another place for dust is underneath the fridge, be sure you check it as well. Ask your neighbours or flatmates to help you move the fridge.

Living room

- Clean the blind slats with a wet cloth. There is usually heavy dust accumulated on the slats.
- Check the lamp shades, no surprise that dust will go there as well.
- Missing some coins or cannot find the remote? Check under the sofa cushions!

Bathroom

- Clean the humidity fan slats. Some fans can have very tiny slats, and you can clean it with old toothbrushes and baby wipes! (So that dust will not go flying when you brush)
- Check behind the toilet, heavy dust alert!
- Watermarks in the shower units/tubs, my tip to get rid off the heavy water stain are to clean with a sponge scrub with bathroom cleaning solutions.

from your chaplain

It's spring time! It's final exams and papers time. It's move-out time. It's time for a change of pace – for travel, a summer job, more time with family and friends, and more enjoyment of life outdoors.

It's been so good to have you living here and taking part in the life of the St. Andrew's Hall resident community this academic year. Your presence has made the Hall a better place for us all. If you are returning in the fall: Hooray! It will be good for you to take a break, but I hope you will be inspired and excited to return to the Hall, your home while you're studying on campus.

It's also Easter time! This Sunday, April 21st (and the following Sunday for the Orthodox Church), Christians all across the world will celebrate Easter, also called Resurrection Sunday. On this day, Christians proclaim their shared faith in Jesus, the Saviour of the world, who was crucified as a criminal and buried in a tomb, but who was raised from the dead by God three days later. In the story of Christ's suffering and resurrection, we discover God's deep passion and love for the world and God's desire to bring new life and hope into our lives, and into all of creation, now and in the future.

No one expected Jesus to rise from the dead. His disciples were grieving, fearful, and



terrified of being arrested by the Jewish authorities because of their association with him. Then Mary Magdalene told Peter and another disciple that the huge stone at the entrance to the tomb had been moved away and Jesus' body wasn't there. The disciples ran to the tomb to check out her story. They looked inside the empty tomb and walked away bewildered. Mary was crying and then she saw someone standing near her in the garden, but she didn't know it was Jesus. She thought he was the gardener. Finally, Jesus spoke her name – "Mary . . ." – and she recognized him. He said to her, "Go to my





brothers and tell them, I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God.” So, Mary went and announced to the disciples, “I have seen the Lord,” and she told them all that he had said to her. (John 20:1-18).

Jesus found Mary and revealed his love and care for her. She was the first witness of Christ’s resurrection. In ancient Jewish culture, a woman’s testimony was essentially worthless, but Jesus chose to entrust her with his crucial message. In speaking to Mary first, Jesus radically affirmed the full dignity of women and the vital value of their witness. He gave her an important mission: To share all he had told her with the disciples. Because she did this, Jesus’ good news was spread throughout the world.

Jesus loves and cares for you. You don’t have to go searching for him. He knows your name and will find you. You may imagine yourself to be lost, or forgotten, or abandoned by God. The Good News is that you are not lost, not forgotten, but instead found by God who in Christ Jesus humbled himself to be with you and for you. Jesus showed us another way to live in the world, not by the way of retaliation and violence, but in the way of humility, peace, and love for enemies. Jesus showed us the way of sacrificial love, and his

love always has the final word. This is the good news of Easter that we celebrate.

The other piece of good news is that Jesus has an on-going mission for his followers, a job worth doing and giving one’s life to. In Jesus’ resurrection, God conquered the power of death, sin, and evil. God has destroyed all the things that destroy us and has given us a death-defying hope that changes the way we look at life and live it. Because Jesus is alive and with us through the Spirit, we can make the world a better and more hopeful place to live in. He has entrusted you and me to share his news and live it with joy. He trusts that you will not keep it to yourself, but share it for the healing and blessing of the whole world.

"Do not be alarmed. You are looking for Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He is risen! He is not here. Look, there is the place where they laid him. But go and tell his disciples and Peter that he is going on ahead of you to Galilee; there you will see him, just as he told you." Then the women fled from the tomb, for terror and amazement had seized them." Mark 16:6,7

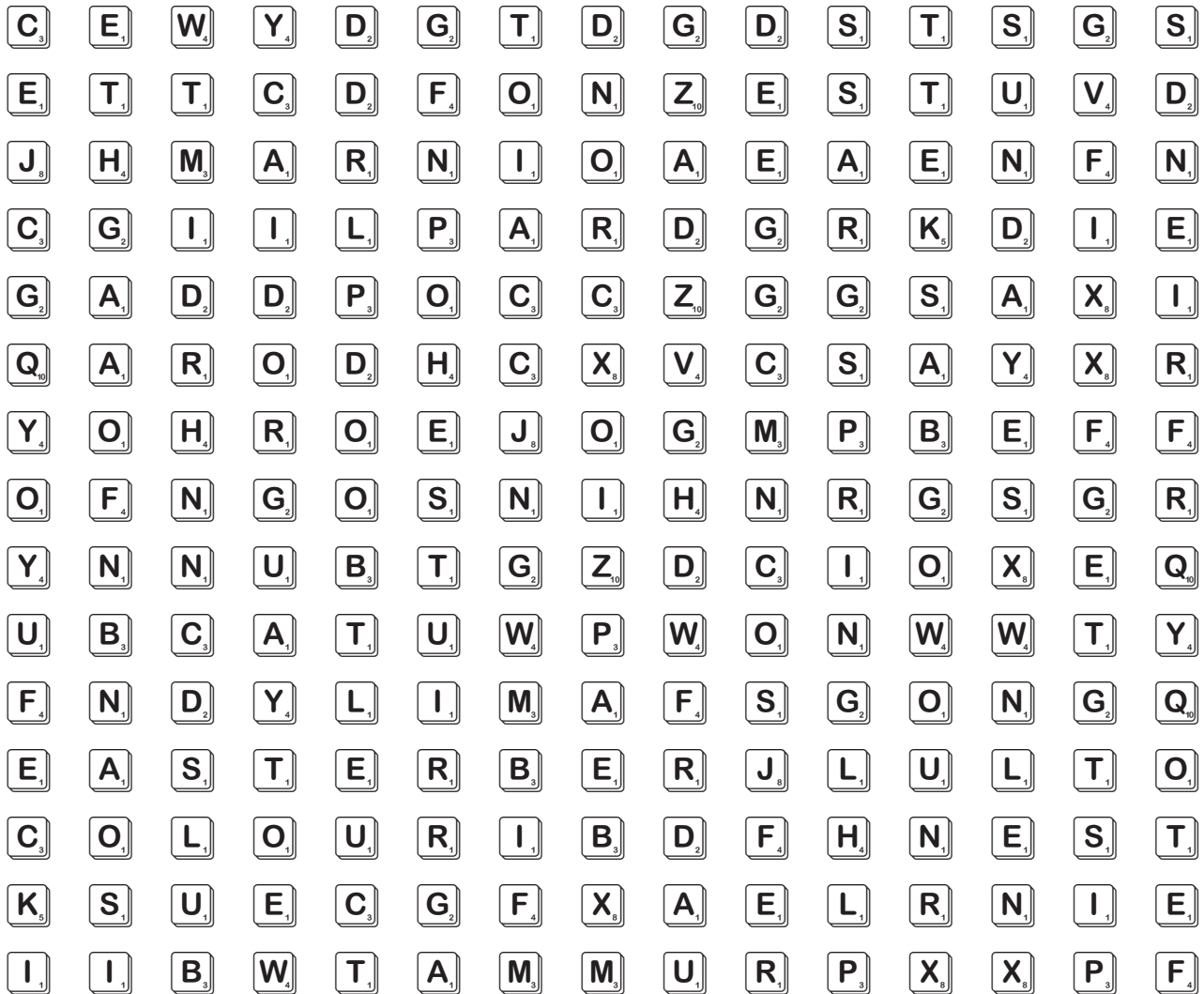
