Dear friends of St. Andrew's Hall,

There is so much to give God thanks for at the end of this 2022-2023 school year. EQUIPPING CHRISTIAN LEADERS FOR MISSION



Graduate Theological Education

The primary mission of St. Andrew's Hall is to educate and form Christian leaders for the church and world. For those Certified Candidates in the PCC seeking formal theological degrees in their equipping for mission, St. Andrew's Hall works with Vancouver School of Theology providing financial support, and the secondment of three St. Andrew's Hall professors to the faculty at VST. With an impressive and robust commitment to hybrid, distance education for over a decade, Presbyterians from across Canada, and indeed around the world, now study at Vancouver School of Theology. The 2005 agreement approved by the General Assembly defines the relationship between St. Andrew's Hall, Vancouver School of Theology, and the Presbyterian Church in Canada (PCC) with St. Andrew's Hall acting on behalf of the PCC as its "sole agent."

The Presbyterian Church in Canada is well represented at Vancouver School of Theology through the seconded faculty of St. Andrew's Hall. The Rev. Dr. Ross Lockhart, Dean of St. Andrew's Hall, serves as Professor of Mission Studies and teaches courses in practical theology. The Rev. Rebecca Simpson serves as Director of Presbyterian Formation and brings her experience as a congregational minister and camp director to bear on her work of equipping leaders for church and para-church ministries. The Rev. Dr. Richard Topping, President of Vancouver School of Theology, is the St. Andrew's Hall Professor of Studies in the Reformed Tradition, offering sought after courses in theology at the basic and advanced degree levels. St. Andrew's Hall strongly supports the vision of Vancouver School of Theology as an institution that is called to educate and form thoughtful, engaged, and generous Christian leaders. St. Andrew's Hall is grateful to VST for its ongoing support and contribution in the formation of Presbyterian leaders, and high standards of academic excellence in the theological academy. Certified Candidates preparing for ordination in the Presbyterian

Church in Canada enroll in the Master of Divinity program at Vancouver School of Theology and receive financial and pastoral support from St. Andrew's Hall throughout their studies. Certified Candidates may also enroll in the joint VST/Regent College program that has students completing a M.Div. from Regent College while taking specified courses from Presbyterian faculty members at VST and earning the Diploma in Presbyterian

Studies. Other students transferring into the Presbyterian Church in Canada may qualify for ordination by taking courses stipulated by the Education and Reception Committee through Vancouver School of Theology, under the direction of Professor Simpson as Director of Presbyterian Formation.

This year St. Andrew's Hall is pleased to report there are twenty-five Presbyterian Church in Canada students enrolled at VST, with four Certified Candidates graduating from the Master of Divinity program. These graduates are from the Presbyteries of Vancouver Island, Westminster, Montreal, and New Brunswick, demonstrating the equipping of Presbyterian leaders at VST from coast to coast. St. Andrew's Hall is working hard to enrich the experience of those preparing for ordained ministry in the PCC at VST, with generous scholarships and bursaries for Presbyterian students, including housing bursaries for Certified Candidates, as well as attending to spiritual life outside the classroom through weekly worship and student retreats at nearby Camp Douglas. In addition to our own Presbyterian Church in Canada students, many international Reformed students studying at VST find a warm welcome in our worship and fellowship events throughout the year. ■

Celebrating Our 2023 Graduates

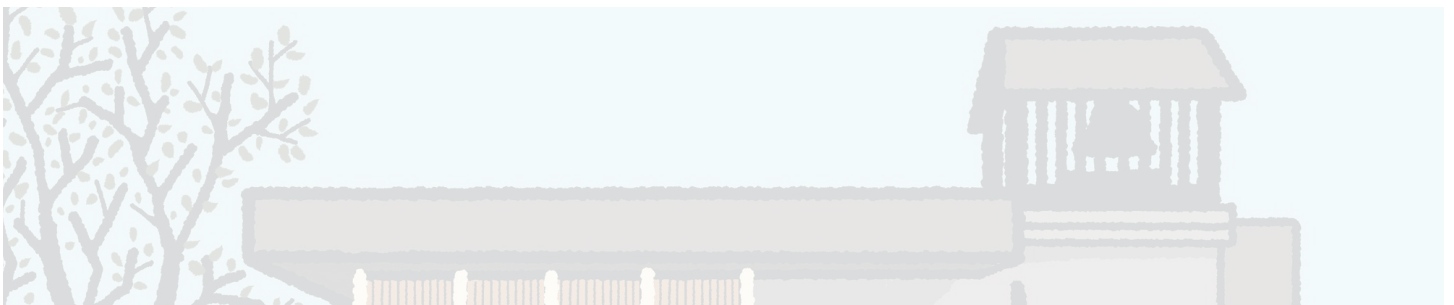

The Centre for Missional Leadership

In addition to graduate theological degree programs at VST, the other way St. Andrew's Hall engages its primary mission to educate and form Christian leaders for the church and world is through the Centre for Missional Leadership. The Centre for Missional Leadership (CML) is a significant ministry of St. Andrew's Hall to the wider church. CML was established by the Board of St. Andrew's Hall in 2015 to equip Christian leaders (including teaching and ruling elders) and congregations for effective witness in a post-Christendom Canadian context. The Rev. Albert Chu was appointed as the second Director of the Centre for Missional Leadership in 2022. Rev. Chu's leadership of CML has been highly productive, widening the impact of CML's ministry to a more ethnically and ecumenical diverse constituency, drawing on his experienced as the founding pastor of a multi-site Reformed church plant in Greater Vancouver. Rev. Chu is building the CML leadership team that now includes Ms. Andrea Perrett, Associate in New Witnessing Communities, the Rev. Dr. Tim Dickau as Associate for Programs, Ms. Amanda Mina in Communications, and the Rev. Dr. Darrell Guder as Senior Fellow. Together, the Centre for Missional Leadership team is equipping leaders to aid in the flourishing of Christian communities faithfully witnessing to God's mission in the world.

This past year the Centre for Missional Leadership equipped local church leaders across Canada through a new cohort in the Missional Certificate program, monthly online pastoral leader Zoom calls, and congregational consulting. CML offered hybrid learning events focused on such diverse topics as the Art of Transitional Ministry to Churches and Affordable Housing to Refugee Claimants and the Church. CML also reached a wide online audience through a weekly column in the "Church for Vancouver" newsletter focusing on important issues for the church and its witness in Canadian society.

CML was delighted to welcome The Rev. Theresa McDonald-Lee as our CML Pastor-in-residence for 2023. Theresa is a graduate of Vancouver School of Theology and co-director of Camp Kintail in Ontario. Theresa is working with Ross Lockhart in a coaching role as the camp develops a new worshipping community at Camp called "Kirk in the Cedars." It was wonderful having Theresa with us to bless our students and participate in community life.

CML is delighted by the growing impact of the annual Guder Scholars program, named in honour of our Senior Fellow, The Rev. Dr. Darrell Guder. CML selects from a diverse group of applicants in their first fifteen years of ordained ministry and provides generous funding to support travel and participation in the summer program on our Vancouver campus. Guder Scholars are primarily Presbyterian Church in Canada ministers, but participants have also come from the PC-USA and the Christian Reformed traditions. The Guder Scholars spend an intensive

week of study while living at St. Andrew's Hall and engaging in a theme connected to missional theology. The participants selected for August 2023 this year will meet with Dr. Priscilla Pope-Levison from Perkins School of Theology. Dr. Pope-Levison is presenting on the theme of "Missional Leadership and Evangelism." For the first time, a public lecture will be offered as part of the program that includes online participation.

CML impacts the local congregation in mission across the country not only through its people and programs, but also through publications. Since its founding in 2015, CML team

members have produced five monographs with the latest being *Better Than Brunch: Missional Churches in Cascadia* (2020), *Christian Witness in Post-Christian Soil* (2021) and *Forming Christian Communities in a Secular Age* (2021). The next resource *Christianity: An Asian Religion in Vancouver* will be published this summer by Cascade Books. The CML team is grateful to God for the impact that our people, programs, and publications are having on congregations across Canada. We are keen to further equip congregations and welcome guest preaching and teaching opportunities from across the Presbyterian Church in Canada. ■

Is God changing the face of the church in North America today? The secularization thesis makes it appear that churches are inevitably declining in membership and influence. Too often, however, this assumption of decline is based on only watching the denominations that were "church plants of Western Christendom" in North America. *Christianity: An Asian Religion in Vancouver* focuses on the context of Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada, and notes through a mixed-methods study including interviews and participant observation that many churches in Vancouver with predominantly Asian composition are growing both in size and influence. What might we learn about God's transforming power by looking to Asia rather than Europe to predict the future of Christian witness in the Pacific Northwest of North America?

"In *Christianity*, Jason Byassee, Albert Chu, and Ross Lockhart share stories of the Asian immigrant Christian experience—part of the migration reshaping the narrative of global Christianity. As a denominational leader, the story of a thriving, growing, and evolving Christian witness is a much-needed corrective to narratives of fatigue and decline. May the faith and hope chronicled in these stories provoke our churches to newness of both imagination and witness."

The First Year Experience at St. Andrew's Hall

Hello I'm Joe Ragbir. I'm in my first year of the Master of Divinity program at Vancouver School of Theology (VST) and I live at St. Andrew's Hall (SAH). I am a certified candidate for ministry in the Presbyterian Church in Canada, and I moved to SAH from Montreal in September 2022 with my lovely wife, Lirah. SAH has been nothing but a blessing. At SAH, I have enjoyed building my small intimate neighborly community with my VST cohort and I have enjoyed meeting many lovely residents in other programs at UBC. My one-word description of SAH is 'community'. The team leading our SAH community have been thoughtful in offering so many events, hospitable in greeting us, and at the forefront of the wellbeing of our community. Within my SAH/VST cohort, I have hosted several friends with boardgame nights, potluck dinners, and have enjoyed the occasional conversations with other SAH friends. Across the parking lot is our amazing Vancouver School of Theology, where many are formed to lead nation-wide ministries. At VST, I am grateful to be equipped with tools for ministry, meeting wonderful people and learning within a diverse community of scholars. Two of my favorite courses this past semester included my early church history course and my missiology course with our Dean Dr. Lockhart, where I reworked my understanding of the purpose of the missional church. This year has been a blessing for both Lira and me. I look forward to continuing my journey with both Vancouver School of Theology and St. Andrew's Hall.

St. Andrew's Hall operates a residential facility for over two hundred students studying full-time at the University of British Columbia or at one of its associated theological colleges. During the summer season, rooms are available on a short-term basis to all people. Not only is the residence a vital source of revenue to St. Andrew's Hall but it also serves as an important venue for Christian witness and worship in the midst of the international, multi-faith (and secular), youthful population that lives and works in the university neighbourhood.

Our ministry of hospitality and witness is made possible by the efforts of a dedicated team. Dean Ross Lockhart serves as administrative head of the college, including the residence. He is ably supported by the executive team of Ms. Mavis Ho (Dean's Executive Assistant), The Rev. Sumarme Goble (Chaplain), Ms. Mihye Park (Housing Manager), Mr. Christopher Orr (Facilities Manager), Ms. Valerie Kerekes (Finance Manager) and The Rev. Albert Chu (CML Director). The executive team is assisted in turn by Ms. Shiraz Dhillon in the housing office, Ms. Amy Lin in bookkeeping and Mr. Sam Simpson in facilities. Ms. Silva Kraal, Ms. Yanfen An and Ms. Hannah Forsythe serve as our three Community Coordinators, living on site at St. Andrew's Hall and caring for our residents.

Weekly hybrid worship services in the Reformed tradition are held in the St. Andrew's Hall chapel throughout the academic year using our smartboard technology that enables distance students to participate and for guest speakers to join us across from the country. The chapel is also home to a Korean language worship gathering for University of British Columbia students on Thursday evenings. A campus wide Alcoholics Anonymous group



also meets in the chapel on weekends. In addition, special events are held throughout the year to foster community among our residents, to celebrate major Christian holidays and to share the gospel through small group discussions and Bible studies. In all of this important campus ministry St. Andrew's Hall is privileged to have The Rev. Sumarme Goble as our Presbyterian chaplain to all at St. Andrew's Hall, as well as her participation in the wider UBC chaplaincy network. This year, two programs for residents provided by Rev. Goble have been particularly well received – one focused on vocation for university students and the other attending to mental health using the Sanctuary Ministries program curriculum developed in Vancouver. We are committed to enacting the missional theology that we teach through the stewardship of all our resources. We believe a Presbyterian residence on one of Canada's major universities, home to a diverse and international student body, is an essential ministry for advancing the gospel. For the over two hundred souls who live at SAH, from undergraduates in quad rooms to singles and couples in studio and one and two-bedroom apartments, to

families with newborns and teenagers in our townhomes, the Christian community of St. Andrew's Hall is a powerful and transforming witness to the larger university campus.

Believing in the importance of our residential life and ministry, the Board of St. Andrew's Hall has been actively advancing the five-year strategic plan through our Property and Development Committee over the last year. The Board authorized the replacement of all furniture in the SAH residence that was showing considerable wear since its purchase in 1995. The pieces of furniture still in good repair were donated to local Christian mission agencies and camps. As well, the Board authorized the refurbishment of the twelve Quad units adding a second shower in order to match the offerings of more recent residential units on campus. All renovations approved by the Board were paid for through the Property Fund of St. Andrew's Hall, that has been well stewarded over the years in anticipation of such improvements. ■

FINANCIAL RESOURCES



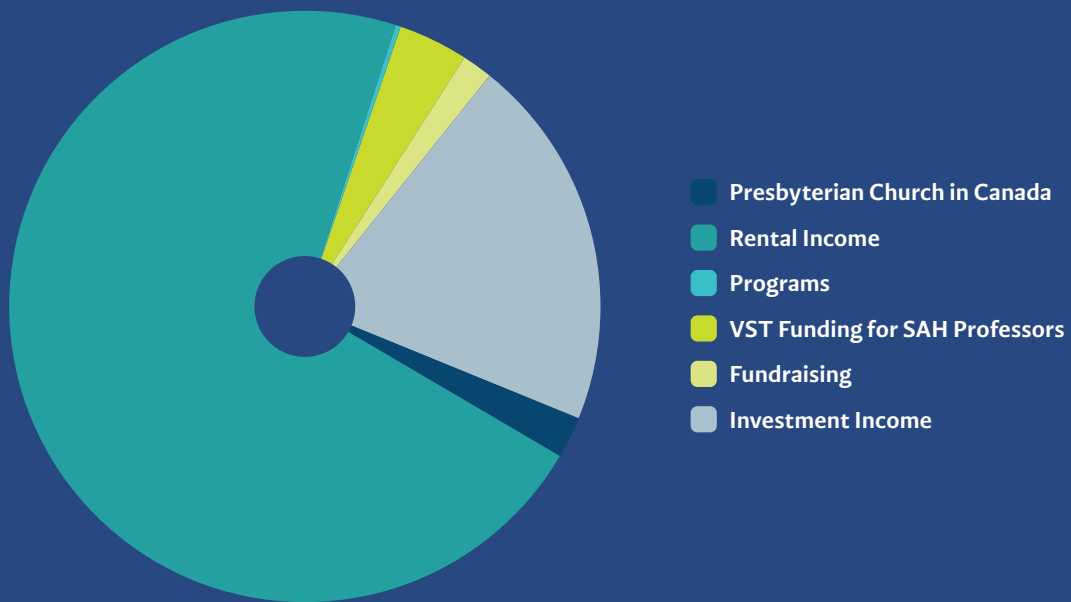
The Board of St. Andrew's Hall is grateful for the resources God has entrusted to us to prepare leaders for a church that serves the world God loves, including an annual grant from Presbyterians Sharing. It is important to note, however, that the annual financial support of the Presbyterian Church in Canada to St. Andrew's Hall is now only a little over \$64,000 out of a total budget of 2.5 million dollars. St. Andrew's Hall funds its ministry primarily through rental income and investment income carefully managed through the Presbyterian Consolidated Fund. Presbyterian student tuition is paid directly to Vancouver School of Theology. Furthermore, the financial support for the Presbyterian Church in Canada's participation at Vancouver School of Theology (student bursaries, scholarships, grant to VST) of over \$500,000 annually is provided by St. Andrew's Hall. To that end, we are grateful for both generous Presbyterian

donors to St. Andrew's Hall, prudent management of our revenues, as well as the faithful stewardship of our investments that together help make a thriving, impactful Presbyterian presence possible on the University of British Columbia campus. 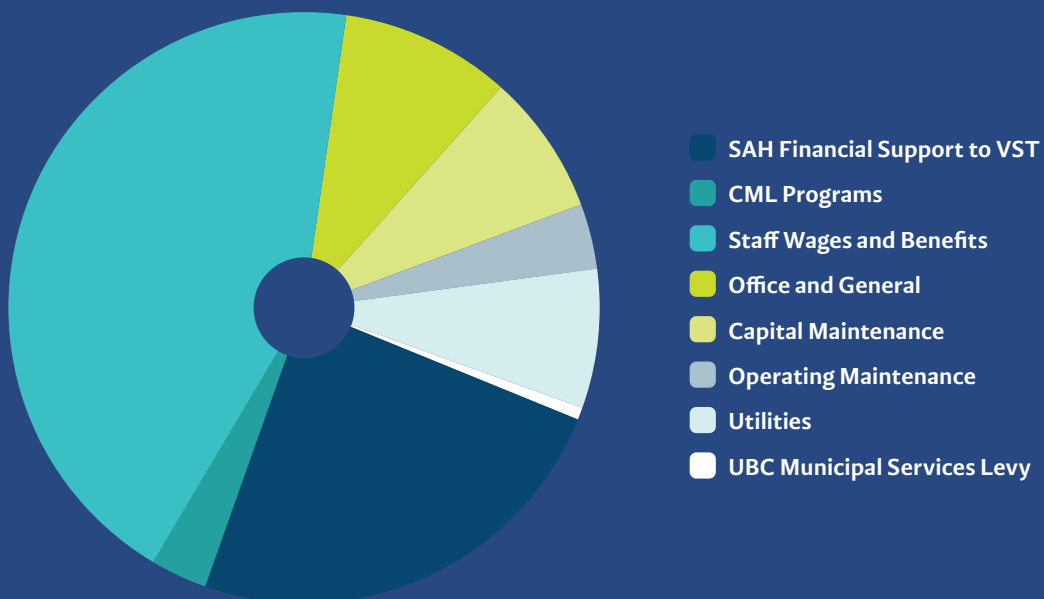

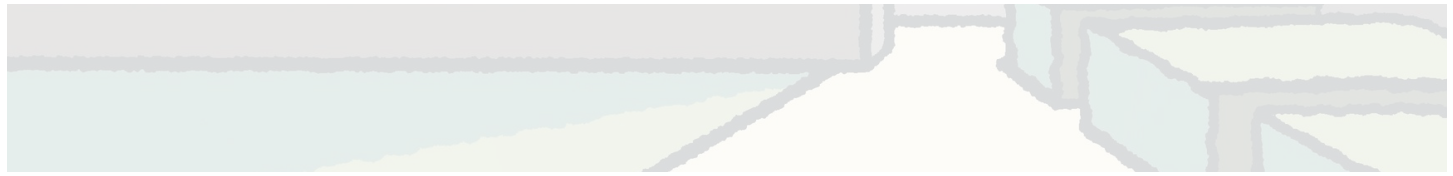
