Homework Assignments (example for September / about 2 ½ hours every month)

1. Understanding and exegeting your neighborhood/Questions for your assignment.

Talk to one person you know who is not part of your church. Explain that you are doing an assignment for a class trying to understand better people's perceptions of churches.

- a. What do you appreciate most about neighbourhood (or city if you live in a smaller center)?
- b. What are two of the most important needs or lacks in your neighborhood?
- c. Do you think the church or churches in your neighborhood make a difference? If so, how?
- Talk to another person in your neighborhood who is poorer or more marginalized than you. This may be someone who is economically, physically or socially isolated (even before Covid-19). Some of you may know or have friends or acquaintances in this situation. If you don't, ask someone who does have a connection to someone in this situation. Get to know them.

Sample questions to ask them:

- a. What do you appreciate about our neighborhood?
- b. What challenges do you face living in this neighborhood?
- c. How could our church be of support to you?
- d. What gifts do you have that you contribute to other people?
- 3. Name 5 churches and 5 organizations that are making a difference for good in your neighborhood or city. Highlight one of them in the google doc for others to see in 50 words or less. If there is one that you are already collaborating with, highlight that group.
